A Message to Voters

Amid talk of “stolen elections” and “voter suppression,” and ongoing discussions about election integrity, it would be easy for voters to lose confidence in the process. After the chaos and fallout from the 2020 Presidential Election, who could blame voters who decide to “sit one out” and avoid casting a ballot this year? But elections are the foundation of democracy; to lose faith in elections is equivalent to losing faith in democracy itself. Citizen participation is at the very core of self-governance.

I’m proud to say election results in Macoupin County, however, have not been questioned in the time I have served as your County Clerk. That’s testament to the hard work and dedication of our Elections Office staff and election judges who commit themselves to training and put in long hours of public service on Election Day and/or during early voting opportunities, as well as political leaders from both major parties. In Macoupin County, we use up-to-date voting technology that electronically tabulates votes but also maintains a paper trail to confirm election results should they ever come under question. Macoupin County elections also are safe from cyber-attacks; our voting machines and tabulating equipment are not connected to the internet in any way. For us, maintaining the integrity of our elections is always Job No. 1.

This year’s election cycle is one of many, many changes. This publication is part of our ongoing effort to ensure all voters in Macoupin County have all the information they need to participate in this critical aspect of maintaining a representative democracy. One of the more significant changes this year involves legislation approved last year and signed into law that moves the Primary Election date from March to Tuesday, June 28. Rationale for the change includes encouraging voter participation by scheduling the Primary Election in summer when Illinois weather is more hospitable. The new law also includes provisions that allow voters to permanently add their names to a list of people to whom vote-by-mail ballots will be mailed for all future elections.

In addition to changes in the state law governing elections, the Macoupin County Board last November voted to reduce the number of voting precincts from 61 to 45. This action not only reduces cost but also

more equitably balances the number of voters residing in each precinct. New voter registration cards were mailed to all eligible voters in January to reflect their precinct. Despite the redrawing of precinct boundaries, 95 percent of the county’s registered voters will vote at the same polling place they did in previous elections for the June 28 Primary and the Nov. 8 General Election.

Primary elections traditionally generate less voter interest and participation than general elections. More than 24,000 of the county’s 32,000 registered voters cast ballots in the 2020 Presidential Election, for example, compared to only 7,400 who voted in the preceding primary election. Yet casting a ballot in the Primary is an important first step toward setting the agenda for the General Election. Primary Election voters determine who the General Election candidates will be for Governor, Attorney General, Treasurer and Comptroller. The Primary also will determine candidates who will run for Secretary of State, stepping into the shoes of long-serving Secretary Jesse White. At the local level, voters will nominate candidates for Macoupin County Clerk, Macoupin County Treasurer, Macoupin County Sheriff, Regional Superintendent of Education, and County Board members representing each of the board’s nine districts. Each of these offices are important and will have an impact on the daily lives of citizens and determine the direction of our government over the next several years.

Some voters shy away from primary elections because they do not wish to declare a party preference in order to receive a ballot. It’s important to note that the requirement for declaring party affiliation applies only to those voters who intend to vote in either Democratic or Republican primary races. Voters who wish to vote on public questions only may do so without declaring a party preference. For this year’s Primary Election, voters within the Panhandle School District will be asked to vote on whether or not to deactivate the Lincolnwood Junior High School facility. Voters in those precincts who do not wish to declare a party affiliation may ask for a special ballot style that has only the public question and none of the political races.

As your County Clerk, it has again been my pleasure to work with staff members, party officials, candi-

dates and public officials to make sure every aspect of the 2022 Primary Election runs smoothly. From finalizing ballots and responding to vote-by-mail requests to setting up polling places and vote counting equipment, administering any election is a mammoth undertaking. This year, we also have worked to allay concerns about possible election interference. I want to personally assure voters that Macoupin County elections are safe from cyber attacks. Our voting machines are not connected to the internet in any way, and we maintain a trail of paper ballots to confirm election results.

The state of the art website allows voters to check the status of their voter registration, find the polling place for their precinct, view sample ballots and obtain other information. On election night, the website will be updated regularly with election results for Macoupin County so voters will know the outcome of local races and ballot issues as soon as ballots are counted.

As always, it is my pleasure to administer this election and I deeply appreciate the opportunity to serve the voters of Macoupin County.

Voter Bill of Rights

You have the right to:

- ❖ Cast your ballot in a non-disruptive atmosphere free of interference.
- ❖ Vote if you’re in line at the polling place by 7:00 p.m.
- ❖ Be a provisional voter if there is a question about your registration status or your eligibility to vote in the election.
- ❖ Vote a federal ballot at your old polling place if you have moved within 30 days of the election.
- ❖ Request assistance in voting, if needed.
- ❖ Bring this voter’s guide or sample ballots into the voting booth, but take them with you when you finish voting.
- ❖ Protect the secrecy of your ballot by using the ballot secrecy folder provided.
- ❖ Receive a new ballot if you make a mistake or change your mind.
- ❖ Check for voting errors (overvotes) after marking your ballot in a private and independent manner.
- ❖ Have your ballot counted fairly and impartially.

Am I Eligible to Vote?

Am I Eligible to Vote?

In order to be eligible to vote in Macoupin County, you must register. The County Clerk's Office processes all voter registration applications for Macoupin County residents. The last day to register for this Election was May 31. See the 'Grace Period Balloting' section on page 6 for more information.

Who Can Register to Vote?

You may register to vote if you are a U.S. citizen and

- ❖ 18 years of age by the date of the next election and

- ❖ a resident at your current Macoupin County address for 30 days immediately prior to the next election.

Two forms of identification are required when registering with a deputy registrar.

At least one of the two forms must show your current name and address.

Only one form of identification may be a piece of mail postmarked within the past 30 days which has been addressed and delivered to you.

Acceptable forms of identification include, but are not limited to the following:

- ❖ Driver's License
- ❖ Birth Certificate
- ❖ State ID Card
- ❖ Social Security Card
- ❖ Utility Bill
- ❖ Employee ID Card
- ❖ Checkbook
- ❖ Student ID Card
- ❖ Library Card
- ❖ Insurance Card
- ❖ Credit Card

Check Your Voter Registration Status

- ❖ Go to www.macoupinvotes.gov

- ❖ Hit '**Voter Lookup**' underneath the photos of Macoupin sites.

- ❖ Enter the information required to check if you are

registered to vote.

If your information appears on screen, you are registered to vote. If it does not, try your legal name or previously used name to see if your registration is outdated.



Voter Information Changes

Keep us up to date with you!

Update important voting information quickly prior to Election Day

Address Change – Any time you move, you have to update your registration. You may do this by visiting MacoupinVotes.com, calling our office, completing a Illinois Voter Registration Application form, or providing a signed written notice that includes your date of birth and signature.

Name Change – If you get married or have a legal name change, you have to update your registration. You can do this by completing an Illinois Voter Registration Application form or by visiting MacoupinVotes.gov.

Signature Change/Update – If your signature has changed dramatically, you need to update your registration. You can do this by completing an Illinois Voter Registration Application form or signing the back of your Voter Information Card.

Voter Information Cards – Your voter information card is routinely mailed to confirm new registration, voter updates or changes in polling places.

New Voter Information Cards were mailed to every voter in the county in January. State law requires the Election Office to mail out voter cards to all voters every two years. This voter file maintenance was the fifth done since October 2011. There was a five-year

break before October 2011 in which no voter file maintenance was completed.

The maintenance mailing is done to ensure only valid registrations for voters are listed in the voter file.

This has multiple goals:

- ❖ Makes sure a voter's registration is complete and up-to-date before the voter tries to vote
- ❖ Cleans the voter file of no longer valid registrations
- ❖ Speeds up Election Day sign-in process by shortening the list of voters given to judges.
- ❖ Reduces costs in the election budget by requiring less ballots and supplies to be printed.

Every registered voter should have received a new card. The new card should be checked to make sure the name and address

of the voter is up to date. If it is not, the voter will need to change their registration before the next election.

Voters are also reminded that if they do not receive a card but feel they are registered, there are a couple of common issues that might explain why they did not receive a card. Their registration information was not updated after moving to a new address or they had a P.O. Box listed on their registration that they no longer use.

Voters are asked to return any cards sent to a person who no longer resides at that address. All that is required is your signature and a note stating the voter no longer lives at that residence so the voter's registration can be removed.

If so, you need to update your signature with the Election Office.

Grace Period Balloting

If I Didn't Register or Forgot to Change My Registration Before the Deadline, Can I Still Vote?

If you were unable to register to vote or change your address prior to the close of registration, you can still register and vote through grace period voting. The close of registration for this election was May 31.

Grace period individuals may register to vote or change their address starting June 1 through Election Day at the County Clerk's Office.

Grace period voting is only available in the Macoupin County Clerk's Office, 201 East Main, Carlinville, IL. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Two forms of identification are required to register or change your registration during grace period voting:

- ❖ At least one of the two forms must show your name and current address,
- ❖ And only one form of identification may be a piece of mail addressed and delivered to you.

The second form must show your name. These forms of identification shall include, but not be limited to:

- ❖ Driver's License
- ❖ Social Security Card
- ❖ Birth Certificate
- ❖ Employee ID

- ❖ Student ID Card
- ❖ Credit Card
- ❖ Library Card
- ❖ Insurance Card
- ❖ Utility Bill
- ❖ Checkbook

- ❖ State ID Card

Grace period voters must vote on the same day they register to vote. They may not vote at the polls on Election Day.

Vote at Your Precinct on Election Day

Election Day is your last chance to vote! To find your polling place, see 'Where Do I Vote on Election Day?' on page 10.

Be sure we have your current information on your registration. See 'Am I eligible to vote?' on page 6 for more information.

Make sure to show up from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. to vote. To avoid lines and congestion at your precinct, you may want to vote in the 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. non rush hour time frame of the day.



How Do Primaries Work?

How do primaries work?

Primary elections decide which candidate will run for each party during the general election. Illinois holds a closed primary, which means voters must choose a single party ballot on the day of a primary election.

Why do I have to choose one party's ballot?

State law requires you can vote in either the Republican or the Democratic primary, but not both. For example, you cannot vote in the Republican primary for President but in the Democratic primary for State's Attorney.

What if I don't want to say which party's ballot I want?

If there are public questions where you live, you will be able to get a non-partisan ballot. However, a non-partisan ballot will not have any candidates on it, just public questions. If there are no public questions on the ballot where you live, to vote you must pick one party's ballot.



What to Expect at the Polls

Voting should be a quick, satisfying experience if you follow a few simple steps. Here are some tips on what to expect at the polls on Election Day:

First, you are required to vote in the precinct where you live. Your voter information card shows your precinct number and polling place location. It can also be found on our website. The polls are open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. To avoid the heavy turnout times of 6 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., we suggest you vote between 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. to avoid long lines.

To ensure a quick process, any changes to your name or address since the last Election should be updated with the Elections Office prior to Election Day.

When you arrive at your precinct, an Election judge will ask your name and address, find your name in the poll book and ask you to sign both an application to vote and the poll book. Your application to vote will be numbered and your ballot will be initialed by an Election judge.

It is important that you review your ballot for accuracy prior to casting your ballot. Once your ballot has been accepted by the voting equipment, no further changes or corrections can be made.

If you have made a mistake, you can ‘spoil’ the ballot you have by giving it back to the judges and getting a new ballot. You can ask any questions you have to the Election judges.

If you registered to vote by mail and the Elections office could not verify your identity, you will be required to show one form of identification from the following list.

- ❖ A current and valid photo identification
- ❖ Utility bill
- ❖ Bank statement
- ❖ Government check
- ❖ Paycheck
- ❖ Government document



Voter Responsibilities

Each registered voter in this state should:

1. Familiarize herself or himself with the candidates and issues.
2. Maintain with the Elections Office their registration with a current name and address.
3. Know the location of her or his polling place and its hours of operation.
4. Bring proper identification to the polling station in case it is needed.
5. Familiarize herself or himself with the operation of the voting equipment in his or her precinct.
6. Treat precinct workers with courtesy.
7. Respect the privacy of other voters.
8. Report any problems or violations of Election laws to the County Clerk’s office.
9. Ask questions, if needed.
10. Make sure that her or his completed ballot is correct before leaving the polling place.



Casting Your Ballot

Optical Scan Voting: As Easy as 1,2,3

1. Receive your ballot

Enter the polling place and give your name and address to an Election Judge. Complete and sign an Application to Vote. Upon verification, the election judge will give you:

- a paper ballot
- a privacy cover
- a pen

2. Enter the voting booth and mark your ballot

Enter the next available voting booth. To vote the optical scan ballot, completely fill in the oval to the left of the candidate or public question of your choice. Be sure to mark both sides of your ballot if needed. If you make a mistake marking your ballot, return it to an Election Judge to receive a new ballot.

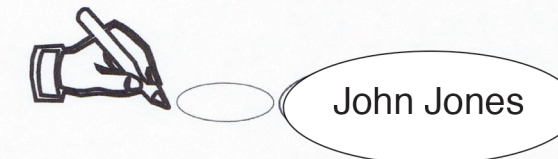
3. Vote!

Cover your ballot with the privacy sleeve and insert the ballot into the ballot tabulator. The Optical Scan System complies with the Help Amer-

ica Vote Act (HAVA) to provide voters an opportunity to check for and correct ballot errors (for example, casting more votes for an office than allowed results in an overvote). If an error is detected, the system will gently beep and give you the option to accept the ballot as is (the overvoted office will not count) or you may return the ballot to an Election Judge and receive a new ballot

FYI...

- ❖ The ballot tabulator will notify you if you have overvoted an office or undervoted an office. Many voters intentionally skip offices which they do not care to vote in, but rarely intentionally vote for more candidates than allowed in any given office. You can either count the ballot as is or go back and check your ballot.
- ❖ The ballot tabulator will notify you if you have inserted a blank ballot or one that it perceived to be blank because it was not marked properly.
- ❖ The “paper trail” provided by this system of voting is not a receipt for the voter, but instead an actual ballot which can be recounted when necessary to insure the integrity of the system.



Where Do I Vote?

During early voting, you can vote at the Elections Office at the Courthouse. Find out more about early voting opportunities on page 16.

On Election Day, you should vote where you live. If your voter registration is up-to-date, you can refer to your voter information card for your precinct number and polling place location or use the voter look-up feature on MacoupinVotes.gov.

However, if you moved and have not updated your voter registration information, you will be required to vote a provisional ballot at the new polling place. You can also come to the Election office at the Courthouse during grace period and change your registration and vote at the same time. See page 6 for more information.



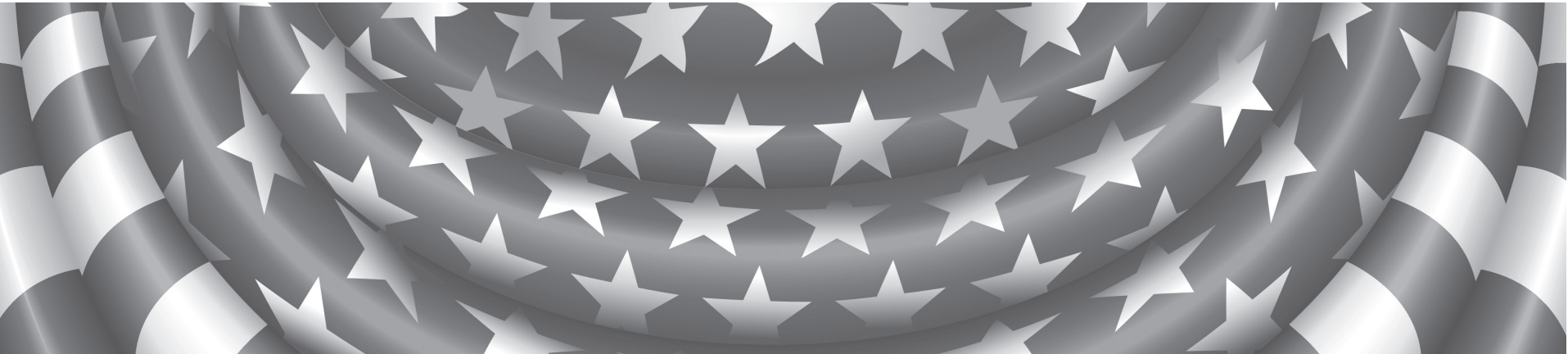
Find Your Polling Place Online

1. Go to www.macoupinvotes.gov.
2. Then click "Voter Lookup" underneath the pictures of the sites in Macoupin County.
3. Enter your voter registration information. You must enter the information exactly as it appears on the voter file, which is exactly as you wrote it when you registered. If your registration information does not immediately appear, try your legal name or old address.
4. Once your information comes up, select "View Polling: under the "My Electons" section.
5. Your polling place, a picture of the building and the ability to Google map the location will appear on screen. Click on the red "Google mapit" to go to Google maps.



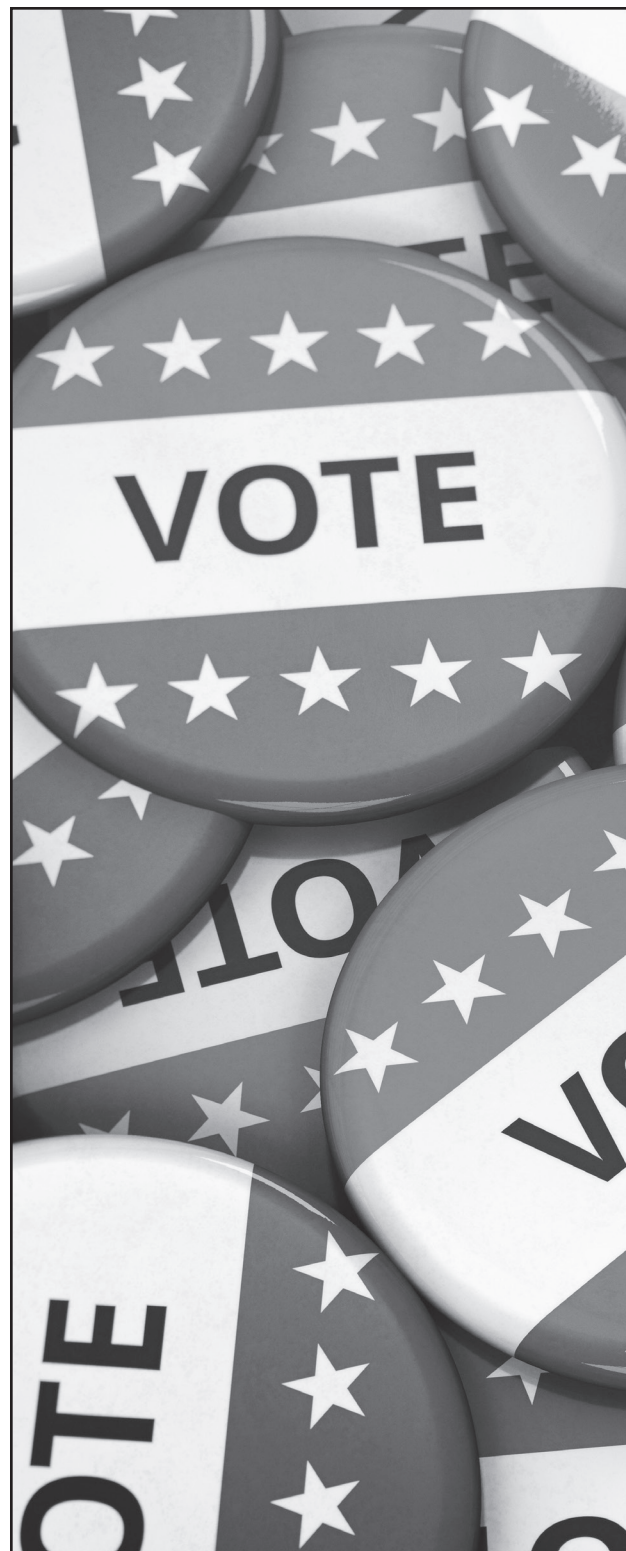

Vote By Mail Now Permanent

The state has approved giving voters the choice of receiving a mail ballot each election without applying each time.

Voters wanting to be placed on the permanent vote by mail list are required to apply for that list. Once they apply, they will remain on the list and have a ballot mailed to them each election going forward. If the voter requests to be removed from the list, there is a change to their registration, or they move out of county, they will be removed from the list and no longer receive a ballot in future elections.

Those wanting to apply can choose to just apply to receive a ballot at general elections and consolidated elections

or they can choose to also receive a primary ballot for the party they put on their application each primary, as well as general elections and consolidated elections.

"I'm very happy that voters who have been voting by mail for years and years will now have the option of requesting a ballot automatically if they so choose," Duncan said. "I'm all for giving voters more choices on how they want to vote. For those who only want to vote at their polling place on Election Day, they can still do that. For those who do apply to vote by mail each election, this is an option that may make sense for you."

This will be more cost-effective and efficient for elections going forward. There are quite a few voters in Macoupin who have voted by mail each election for many years. Each Election, the Election office has probably mailed them an application, and they've mailed it back to get their ballot. While it's not a lot of postage and costs, eliminating that step by that voter going on the permanent mail ballot list does save money. It also helps our Election office since they will have a head start on vote by mail ballot mailing since it will be known going in how many permanent mail ballots are going out, and can get them to voters right away.

Vote By Mail Ballot Processing

How do we process a voter's Vote by Mail ballot?

- ❖ You request an application for vote by mail ballot
- ❖ We send you an application with instructions
- ❖ You fill out the application and send it to us.
- ❖ We enter the vote by mail application into the voter registration system.

- ❖ We send you the vote by mail ballot packet with instructions.
- ❖ You vote the ballot and seal it in the ballot envelope.
- ❖ You provide the sealed ballot envelope to us with applicable affidavits in the mail envelope provided.
- ❖ We receive the mail envelope and log receipt in the voter registration system.
- ❖ We keep the ballot in the sealed envelope until Election Day.

- ❖ On Election Day, election judges open the sealed ballot envelope
- ❖ The ballot is scanned into the vote by mail ballot system.
- ❖ After the polls close the scanned ballots are tabulated.
- ❖ Preliminary Vote by Mail ballot results are reported to the public as part of the precinct results after the polls close on Election Day.



Vote by Mail Balloting

Who Can Vote by Mail?

Any registered voter in Macoupin County is eligible to cast a vote by mail ballot, without specifying a reason why they will be absent from the polling place on Election Day. Voters who registered by mail and did not provide sufficient proof of identity will be notified by the County Clerk that their registration is not complete. They will be ineligible to vote until they provide the required proof of identity at the polling place on Election Day or when requesting a vote by mail ballot.

Can I Vote Absentee?

Illinois law has changed the name of absentee voting to voting by mail. If you want to vote absentee, you will now do it as a vote by mail.

How do I apply to vote by mail?

You can request an application to vote by mail in many different ways. You can come in person to the Election office, send in a request by mail, call (217) 854-3214 ext 918 or apply online at MacoupinVotes.gov.

The Election office will need the voter's name, residence address, mailing address and date of birth at the time of request.

What's the deadline to apply to vote by mail?

The deadline is Thursday, June 23 by 4:30 p.m. The Election office cannot mail a ballot to you after that time.

How to Vote by Mail

Step 1 : Once you have applied and returned your signed application, the Election's office will mail you your vote by mail ballot packet. The packet—including a ballot, instructions on how to fill out your Vote by Mail ballot, certificate envelope, and a return mailing envelope with pre-paid postage—will be mailed to the voter.

Step 2: Upon receipt of the vote by mail ballot packet, follow all instructions on how to vote and return the ballot to the County Clerk's Office. Make sure to seal just your ballot in the secrecy envelope and place the secrecy envelope and certification card in the return envelope.

What is the deadline to return my ballot to the Election office?

Returned vote by mail ballots must be postmarked by Tuesday, June 28, and must be received by the Election Office within 14 days of Election Day. If you want to personally deliver your ballot to the Election office, it must be received by no later than 7 p.m. on election day. You may authorize any person to return your ballot to the election authority, as long as you have signed the affidavit on the ballot envelope affirming that authorization was given to deliver the ballot.

Can I receive assistance in voting my ballot?

If you receive assistance in voting your ballot, the name and address of the individual providing the assistance must be placed on the ballot certification card. Remember that a candidate is NOT allowed to assist a voter unless the candi-

date is a spouse, parent, child or sibling of that voter.

Military and Overseas Voting

Members of the Uniformed Services and their family members or U.S. citizens residing overseas whose last known address is in Macoupin County and wish to vote by mail may do so by completing and mailing an FPCA (Federal Post Card Application). By completing this application, you will automatically be sent a vote by mail ballot for one calendar year.

Vote by Mail Ballot Integrity

It is illegal to:

- Make a false statement to obtain a vote by mail ballot or solicit someone to do so
- Vote a Vote by Mail ballot unless you qualify for one
- Have a candidate assist you in voting unless the candidate is a spouse, parent, child or sibling of that voter.

Do not let anyone:

- Mark your ballot, or unduly influence your ballot selections, unless you require assistance. Individuals who cannot assist voters include the Voter's Employer or Agent of that Employer, or Officer or Agent of the Voter's Union.
- On your behalf, sign your name to the Application for a Vote by Mail Ballot and/or certificate envelope. By law, the Macoupin County Clerk's Office compares the facsimile signature at registration with the signature provided on the Application for Vote by Mail Ballot and certificate envelope.



Track Your Vote by Mail Ballot

Track Your Ballot's Return To Election Office And See If It Was Counted

1. Visit www.macoupinvotes.com/checkmyballot/
2. Enter your name and the address we mailed your ballot to.
3. You will be able to see notifications on when your ballot will be delivered back to the Election office and then the actual delivery date.

4. You will also be able to see if your ballot was counted (accepted) or rejected.
5. If you would like, you can also sign up for email and/or text notifications regarding your ballot's delivery back to the office and whether it was counted or not. Just check the box next to the statement that you would like to receive those notifications and enter your email and/or phone number.



More Information, Less Cost

It is hard to believe but with the 2022 Primary Voter's Guide, it has now been 10 years since I published the first guide for the 2012 General Election. And it is still one of the things people talk to me the most about that I've done since taking office.

But since it's been a decade of publishing the guide, I wanted to take a minute and talk about one of the things I'm most proud about it, it's actually saving you money.

By state law, I am required to publish the sample ballot for the whole county, polling place locations, a notice of the election, the notice of any public questions, the notice of the public test of the voting machines, the early vote schedule, and in the case of

a primary, the color of the ballots for each party.

Before I started the Voter's Guide, each of these was run separately in each of the county's newspapers. In total, for the 2012 Primary, the last election those notices ran separately, it cost the Election office \$12,351 to publish all those notices.

For comparison's sake, the 2021 Consolidated Election Guide was the most recent guide published and paid for. That guide cost a total of \$4,921 to have set-up, printed, and inserted in all the local newspapers.

That's a savings of over \$7,430 of taxpayer money for just one Election. And on top of the savings, the guide puts all of the

required information from the other notices in one document, as well as significantly more than required notices that answer just about any question a voter may have about voting.

So with the 10 year anniversary of the first Voter Guide this year, I wanted to take this space to celebrate a better, smarter way of doing things that saves you money. It's one of the reasons the Voter's Guide is one of my favorite things I've done since taking office. Hopefully, you've found it useful as well.

How Do I Vote Early?

WHAT IS EARLY VOTING?

Registered voters may cast a ballot prior to Election Day without having to provide a reason for wanting to vote early. This ballot is cast by personal appearance at the Macoupin County Clerk’s office or at a location set up by the County Clerk.

WHEN DOES EARLY VOTING OCCUR?

Early voting runs through June 27.

WHERE CAN PEOPLE VOTE?

People may vote at the Macoupin County Clerk’s office, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Special evening and Saturday hours are listed below. The County Clerk’s office is located on the first floor of the the County Courthouse in Carlinville.

IF I VOTE EARLY, BUT CHANGE MY MIND, MAY I VOTE ON ELECTION DAY?

No. The law prohibits a person who voted during the early voting period from voting again on Election Day.

ARE POLLWATCHERS ALLOWED AT EARLY VOTING SITES?

Yes. Just as with a regular polling place on Election Day, pollwatchers may be appointed to observe early voting by personal appearance at each permanent and temporary polling place where early voting is conducted.

WHAT ARE THE SAFEGUARDS AGAINST VOTER FRAUD?

Election judges will compare the voter’s signature with the signature from when the voter registered.

The votes cast during the early voting period will not be counted until after the polls close on Election Day.

WHAT IS THE REASON FOR EARLY VOTING?

A major reason for early voting is to encourage greater participation in the election. People who travel for business, work long hours or are otherwise inconvenienced by the hours the polls are open may find it easier to vote early.

Election Security

Election Security allow you to cast your vote with confidence

Election security is a top priority for all election authorities and the Macoupin County Clerk’s office has continued to employ effective and forward-thinking cybersecurity measures to further strengthen our county’s elections systems and safeguard our elections infrastructure against any malicious cyber activity.

Since the 2016 Presidential Election, there have been many questions and stories about how secure our Elections are and can our votes be hacked. When it comes to Macoupin County, we wanted to give you the hard facts about how our Election is secure.

■ None of our voting machines are ever connected to the internet, either in the polling place or when votes are being counted, meaning they can never be hacked

■ All machines are locked and sealed to prevent any kind of tampering or system interference

■ All ballots cast have a paper trail. Whether you vote a paper ballot or on the touchscreen, there is a paper trail of how your vote was cast

■ All voting machines are tested before the Election with a test deck of ballots being voted on machines and then tabulated to ensure the machine results are correct and match the test deck of ballots

■ While voting is occurring, Election judges periodically inspect the equipment to ensure there has been no tampering or damage

■ Election judges at the polling place confirm that there are zero votes cast at the opening of voting and must compare the number of ballots cast to the number of voters that applied to vote at the end of the day

■ Poll watchers are allowed to observe all early voting and Election Day polling locations

■ After the Election, a retabulation of selected precincts by the State Board of Election will be done to ensure that the reported results match up to the ballots cast

We take ensuring every vote is counted and counted correctly seriously in Macoupin. When it comes to cyber security, the County Clerk’s office has taken numerous steps to enhance our security processes. While we don’t want to detail them all publicly for those who may want to interfere to see, we have and will continue to try and stay one step ahead of any attempts to disrupt Macoupin’s Elections.

★ Become an Election Judge ★

What are judges of election?

Judges of election are responsible for the administration of election procedures in the polling place on election day. They are in the position of ensuring that the election process is administered fairly and in accordance with our laws.

What are the qualifications necessary to be an election judge?

- ❖ Be a citizen of the United States.
- ❖ Be of good repute and character.
- ❖ Be able to speak, read and write the English language.
- ❖ Be of good understanding and capable.
- ❖ Not be an elected committeeman.
- ❖ Need to be registered to vote in the county.
- ❖ Each Election Judge is required to declare their party preference so they can be assigned accordingly. (See how judges are selected in the following section.)

How are judges selected?

Election Judges are chosen by the County Clerk and by the Party Chairpersons. The party which cast the highest average number of votes at the most recent three gubernatorial elections in the precinct shall be represented by three judges, the party which casts the second highest number of votes at the most recent three gubernatorial elections in the precinct shall be represented by two judges.

How are election judges trained?

Before each election, several election judge training schools will be held. This course covers the duties and responsibilities of election judges and an examination which tests reading skills, ability to work with poll lists, ability to add and knowledge of election laws governing the operation of polling places is given every two years. Judges who have attended and completed the class will receive \$160 for their duties on election day. Judges who have not attended and completed the class will receive \$150 for their duties on election day.

What are some of the duties of the judges of election?


- ❖ Open and close the polls.
- ❖ Be responsible for election materials.
- ❖ Ensure that only qualified voters are permitted to vote and that each qualified voter is permitted to vote once and only once.
- ❖ Give instructions in the method of voting when requested by a voter.
- ❖ Give assistance to illiterate and physically disabled voters.
- ❖ Maintain order in the polling place throughout the day.
- ❖ Tally the votes after the polls are closed; and to certify the election results in that precinct.

How may I become an election judge?
